## of an urban centre

definitions of urban centre and the process of urbanism Historians would consider urban centre as a unit of settlement, established by man, influenced historical factors. The Archaeologists take any settlement as urban which exposes few streets two public buildings. The Anthropologists and Sociologists consider urban growth as a natural and consider population and ecological factors as of prime importance in the growth of towns.

Childe has listed monumental buildings, large settlement with dense population, non-food producing (including rulers, artisans and merchants) and the cultivation of art, science and writing as the traits of the urban revolution which took place in the bronze age. According to him, craft specialists as the role of surplus which supported non-food producing classes were important to enliven a city.

But according to Adams increased size and density of population are crucial to urbanism and the substitution of specialized crafts is negligible to primary urban needs. (Adams:1968: 18-26)

Among Indian Historians, A. Ghosh was one of the pioneer Archaeologists to tackle the problem of manization in early historical times. He considered an administrative and mercantile organization to be pre-requisite for a city. (Ghosh:1973:19)
